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VISIT BERLIN

BERLIN AND ITS DIVISION FROM 1961 - 1989

As a consequence of Nazi Germany's defeat in World War II in May 1945 the four Allies Soviet Union, United States, Great Britain and France divided Germany into four military occupation zones which splitted later the country into West- and East-Germany.

Germany's capital Berlin was in East-Germany hence in the zone of the Soviet Union. Nevertheless the Western Allies wanted as well a part of Berlin and occupied West Berlin while East Berlin was occupied by Soviet Union. Due to this fact West Berlin was surrounded by East German territory like an island. Therefore Berlin's history after 1945 is largely influenced by its special division since 1945 (see graphic above).

This bulletin takes a look on Berlin's division from 1961 until 1989 and its unique situation which arose from the division.

(continued) Definitely the largest impact of Berlins division was the building of the Berlin Wall in 1961 between West and East Berlin. The government of East-Germany decided to build the wall because many East-Germans were imigrating to West-Germany for economical reasons.

From that point on it was not possible for East-Germans to visit the other side of the city. West-Germans were usually only allowed to go to East Berlin for less than one day. One of the rare checkpoints along the wall was Checkpoint Charlie which was directly in the city center.

Nowadays it is really hard to imagine that the wall went through the whole city dividing streets, neighborhoods and families from one day to another.

As a consequence of the peaceful demonstrations in East Berlin in November 1989 the government of East Germany opened the Wall which ended the devision of the city.

If you visit Berlin you can still see some remains like the famous East Side Gallery along the river Spree.
